

Legislative Update



• Students who graduate from high school mid-year may submit a *Florida Financial Aid Application* no later than August 31 prior to the student's graduation, be evaluated for Bright Futures, and, if eligible, receive funding in the current academic year following the student's high school graduation



- <u>Initial and renewal</u> students required to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be awarded funds
 - No federal verification required for state programs
- University of Florida's Innovation Academy students receive funding in spring and summer terms (limited to two terms of funding per year – summer may be one of the two)



- Students graduating high school in 2012-13 are eligible to accept an initial Bright Futures award within two years (rather than the current 3 years for reinstatement) following high school graduation
- Remember: 2012-13 grads may accept a renewal award for five years following high school graduation (not new)



- Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars graduating in 2011-12 and thereafter may receive an award for 100% of the number of hours required to complete only one of the following programs at a Florida public or eligible Florida private postsecondary institution:
 - Applied Technology Diploma (ATD), up to 60 credit hours or equivalent clock hours
 - Technical Degree Education Program (AS, AAS, CCC), not to exceed 72 credit hours or equivalent clock hours
 - Career Certificate Program (PSAV), not to exceed 72 credit hours or equivalent clock hours

Bright Futures Scholarship Awards

- Students may receive funding for ONE of the three awards:
 - > Florida Academic Scholars Award (FAS)
 - ➤ Florida Medallion Scholars Award (FMS)
 - ➤ Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars Award (GSV)



Florida Academic Scholars Award

• GPA

3.5 weighted GPA in required college preparatory credits (not rounded)

Required Credits

- > 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- > 4 Math (Algebra I level and above)
- > 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- > 3 Social Science
- > 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language one being a completer course)



Florida Academic Scholars Award

Community Service

100 hours – approved by district or private high school registered with the FDOE

Test Scores

- > 1280 (up from 1270) SAT Reasoning Test or 28 ACT
- > ACT scores rounded up for scores with .5 and higher
- Writing sections not used in composite
- SAT Subject Tests not used
- Deadlines (tests taken by):
 - > January 31 for early (7th semester) eligibility
 - June 30 for summer (8th semester) eligibility

Florida Academic Scholars Award

- Other ways to qualify must include 100 community service hours:
 - National Merit or Achievement Scholars and Finalists
 - National Hispanic Scholars
 - ➤ IB Diploma (based on exams taken before high school graduation or completion of IB requirements)
 - ➤ IB Curriculum with 1280 (up from 1270) SAT or 28 ACT
 - AICE Diploma (based on exams taken before high school graduation or completion of AICE requirements)
 - AICE Curriculum with 1280 (up from 1270) SAT or 28 ACT
 - Home Education, registered with district Grades 11 & 12 and have a best composite score of 1280 (up from 1270) SAT or 28 ACT



Florida Academic Scholars Award

- Other ways to qualify must include 100 community service hours:
 - ➤ GED with best composite score of 1280 (up from 1270) SAT or 28 ACT and a 3.5 weighted GPA in the 16 required credits
 - ➤ 3-year standard college preparatory program with best composite score of 1280 (up from 1270) SAT or 28 ACT and a 3.5 weighted GPA in the 16 required credits



Florida Medallion Scholars Award

• GPA

3.0 weighted GPA in required college preparatory credits

Required Credits

- 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- 4 Math (Algebra I level and above)
- > 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- 3 Social Science
- 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language one being a completer course)



Florida Medallion Scholars Award

Community Service

> 75 hours – approved by district or private high school registered with the FDOE

Test Scores

- > 1020 (up from 980) SAT Reasoning Test or 22 (up from 21) ACT
- > ACT scores rounded up for scores with .5 and higher
- SAT Subject Tests not used
- Writing sections not used in composite
- Deadlines (tests taken by):
 - > January 31 for early (7th semester) eligibility
 - > June 30 for summer (8th semester) eligibility

Florida Medallion Scholars Award

- Other ways to qualify must include 75 community service hours:
 - National Merit or Achievement Scholars and Finalists
 - National Hispanic Scholars
 - IB Diploma (based on exams taken prior to high school graduation or completion of IB requirements)
 - ➤ IB Curriculum with 1020 (up from 980) SAT or 22 (up from 21) ACT
 - AICE Diploma (based on exams taken prior to high school graduation or completion of AICE requirements)
 - AICE Curriculum with 1020 (up from 980) SAT or 22 (up from 21) ACT
 - Home Education, registered with District Grades 11 & 12 and 1070 SAT or 23 ACT OR best combined score of 1020 (up from 980) SAT or 22 (up from 21) ACT with 3.0 weighted GPA in the 16 required credits (documented through Florida public, FDOE-registered private, Florida Virtual School [FLVS] or dual enrollment transcripts)

Florida Medallion Scholars Award

- Other ways to qualify must include 75 community service hours:
 - GED with best composite score of 1020 (up from 980) SAT or 22 (up from 21) ACT and a 3.0 weighted GPA in the 16 required credits
 - > 3-year standard college preparatory program with best composite score of 1020 (up from 980) SAT or 22 (up from 21) ACT and a 3.0 weighted GPA in the 16 required credits



GPAs

- > 3.0 weighted GPA in the core credits required for graduation
- > 3.5 unweighted GPA in 3 Career and Technical Education credits in one vocational program



- Required Credits (4-year diploma)
 - > 4 English
 - 4 Math (including Algebra I)
 - > 3 Natural Science (2 with lab component)
 - > 3 Social Science (U.S. History, World History, U.S. Government, and Economics)
 - > 1 Fine or Identified Practical Art OR .5 in each
 - Physical Education (to include the integration of health)



Community Service

30 hours – approved by district or private high school

Test Scores

- SAT Reasoning Test
 - > 440 Critical Reading
 - > 440 Math
- ACT National Test
 - > 17 English
 - > 18 Reading
 - > 19 Math
- Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (PERT)
 - 99 Writing
 - > 104 Reading
 - > 113 Math



- Other ways to qualify must include 30 community service hours:
 - > 3-year Career Preparatory Diploma with 3.0 weighted GPA in 14 core credits required
 - 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
 - 4 Math (including Algebra I)
 - > 3 Natural Science (2 with lab component)
 - > 3 Social Science (U.S. History, World History, U.S. Government, and Economics)
 - > 3.5 unweighted GPA in a minimum of 3 Career and Technical Education credits in one vocational program



- Other ways to qualify must include 30 community service hours:
 - > 3-year College Preparatory Diploma with 3.0 weighted GPA using 16 core credits required
 - > 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
 - > 4 Math (Algebra I level and above)
 - > 3 Natural Science (2 with lab component)
 - > 3 Social Science (U.S. History, World History, U.S. Government, and Economics)
 - 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language one being a completer course)
 - ➤ 3.5 unweighted GPA in a minimum of 3 Career and Technical Education in one vocational program



- Other ways to qualify must include 30 community service hours:
 - ➤ GED with 3.0 weighted GPA in core credits for selected HS graduation option (standard, career, or college), and
 - ➤ 3.5 unweighted GPA in 3 Career and Technical Education credits in one vocational program



Award Amounts

- Public and Private Institutions
- Students will receive the specified award amounts established annually by the Florida Legislature in the General Appropriations Act.
- Funding begins the fall following high school graduation.

Academic Top Scholars Award

- One FAS award recipient per county
- Ranked on BF GPA and SAT/ACT score
- Award established annually by the Florida Legislature in the General Appropriations Act
- Determined end of fall term following HS graduation and after term one disbursements
- Students and high schools notified in November



General Eligibility Requirements

- Graduate from a Florida public high school or FDOE-registered private high school (for GED, Out-of-State & Home Education exceptions see www.FloridaStudentFinancialAid.org/ssfad/bf)
- Not guilty of, or plead no contest to, a felony charge
- Florida resident and U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen as determined by the postsecondary institution
- Seeking undergraduate degree or certificate at an eligible Florida postsecondary institution



General Eligibility Requirements

- Enrolled for at least 6 non-remedial semester credit hours
- Begin using the scholarship funds within two years (down from three years) of high school graduation (exception: military service)
- Annually submit an error-free *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA) before the first disbursement



How to Apply

- Students must complete the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) before high school graduation or forfeit BF eligibility
- <u>www.FloridaStudentFinancialAid.org</u> (Select **State Grants**, **Scholarships & Applications**)
- FFAA closes August 31
- Submit ONE application update as needed



Eligibility Evaluations

Completed twice a year:

- After 7th semester (fall term) based on:
 - Coursework completed
 - Coursework in progress for spring semester
 - ➤ Test scores for tests taken through January 31
 - Community service completed by end of fall term
- After 8th semester (graduation) based on:
 - Coursework completed
 - > Test scores for all tests taken through June 30
 - Community service completed by high school graduation



Eligibility Notifications

- Mid-year (7th semester) begin March
- Final (8th semester) begin:
 - June for tests taken through April for FAS awardees only
 - August for tests taken through June for all other awardees
- Students must graduate to be awarded
- Posted to student's Financial Aid Recipient History online – NO hardcopies or e-mails
- Students monitor award status online


Application Status & Award History

Section 1009.531 (4), Florida Statutes

Public high school student report cards must contain a disclosure that the grade point average calculated for purposes of the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program may differ from the grade point average on the report card.
