## Year Two Fast Facts

## SLS 1515 Cornerstone Experience

- 103 sections of SLS 1515 were offered college-wide
- 2,298 students were served through the course

#### Why bother with a QEP?

The easy answer is that it is a required part of our Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Commission on Colleges accreditation. Core Requirement 2.12. As a SACS-COC reviewer of other colleges, I take the evaluation of an institution's QEP plan very seriously. Institutions achieve "quality" when they are intentional and focused on the mission of student learning and/or the environment which supports it. The beauty of FSW's QEP is that it is focused on both aspects. Student learning outcomes (especially critical thinking) are intentional in the course design and the subsequent evaluation instruments are used to measure success. The supporting environment is also built into

the extra-curricular requirements. The QEP is having measureable success on ensuring students survive and prosper during the critical first year of college. Why bother with a QEP? It is the organizing structure for the first-year student. The QEP currently impacts more students, faculty, and staff than any other initiative at the college. Student success is everyone's job and FSW's QEP is designed to make sure new students are given a model with which they can succeed.

A first-year experience course is a unique blend of the development of academic and social skills. FSW's QEP has strengthened the relationship among Academic Affairs, Student Affairs, and Enrollment Management for the betterment of the students. During the College's second year of full implementation of the QEP, faculty, staff and administrators from across the college's programs and campuses continued to work together to promote student success through data-informed initiatives. The qualitative and quantitative data we collect demonstrates that participation in the SLS 1515 course and FYE Programs has positively impacted student engagement, persistence and academic achievement. Beginning Fall 2014, all first-time in college degree-seeking

students are required to enroll in and successfully complete the Cornerstone Experience course. To continue to best support student success, we look forward to expanded partnerships with departments through linked courses, honors affiliate opportunities, and career-interest based sections.



#### Dr. Kathy Clark Associate Dean, Academic Success Co-Chair, Quality Enhancement Plan

During the 2013/2014 academic year, an opportunity surfaced for the college to advance its timeline of full implementation of the QEP. Data from the 2013/14 academic year revealed many student achievements, including the QEP goals of increased retention and student engagement. Achievement of these goals can be attributed to the dedicated faculty and staff working together to enhance the students' first-year experience. As Norman Vincent Peale states: "People become really quite remarkable when they start thinking that they can do things. When they believe in themselves, they have the first secret of success." This is the hope we try to instill in our students. As we move forward with the full implementation of the QEP, let us reflect on the data

presented in this annual review and the numerous ways in which the Cornerstone Experience course provides students with the tools for success!

## Retention

Academic Year 2013 –2014 marked the second year of full implementation of the QEP. During this year, first-year students testing into any developmental course were required to enroll in the Cornerstone Experience course (SLS 1515).



Table 1 shows the term -toterm retention rates of students testing into each developmental discipline (i.e. Reading, Writing, Mathematics). Students testing into developmental courses who were enrolled in the Cornerstone Experience course (SLS 1515) were retained to the next semester at greater rates than students testing into developmental courses who were not enrolled in the SLS 1515.



#### Dr. Joseph van Gaalen, Coordinator Academic Assessment

I think it's telling that the retention rates of SLS 1515 students and non-SLS students exhibit statistically significant differences at the term-to-term level. The answer to the question of why this is will help drive instruction in sync with the purpose of assessment.



Table 2 shows the term-to-term retention rates for first-year students from Fall to Spring over the last three years. Students who enrolled in SLS 1515 class in Fall 2013 were retained and continue their education at higher rates than those students who did not enroll in SLS 1515.

Note: The first semester of full implementation of the QEP was Fall 2012. At that time students testing into two or more developmental courses were required to enroll in SLS 1515. During Fall 2013, students testing into any number of developmental courses were required to enroll in SLS 1515.

## **Critical Thinking**

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Each semester, Cornerstone students take the California Critical Thinking Disposition Inventory (CCTDI) as a Pre-Test and Post-Test. The chart below shows a comparison of the mean scores for Fall 2013 and Spring 2014 CCTDI results. Among the seven dimensions of Critical Thinking behaviors measured by the exam, students achieved the greatest gains in Confidence in Reasoning, Analyticity, and Truth Seeking.





#### Professor Scott VanSelow, Cornerstone Experience

Being involved with the QEP through the QEP Advisory Committee and the QEP Assessment Committee has been one of the highlights of my career at FSW. It is very rewarding to work on enhancing quality and improving student success. My fellow committee members also make it enlightening and fun. I am looking forward to expanding my participation with the QEP in my new role as a full-time Cornerstone Experience faculty member.

#### **Critical Thinking Initiatives**

- In Spring 2014, a workshop entitled "Engendering Truth-seeking Dispositions in College Classrooms" was offered to faculty through the Teaching and Learning Center.
- In Spring 2014, Lee Campus Library faculty began offering "Truth-seeking" workshops for students. Information from the workshops includes: learning how to evaluate information, credibility of websites and searching for information on the Internet. Due to their popularity, all campuses and centers began offering these workshops in Fall 2014.
- Beginning Fall 2014, the college will offer a "Critical Thinking in Careers" lecture series for students. The series feature faculty, administrators, staff and community leaders.
- The annual Cornerstone Critical Thinking event in Fall 2013 was led by Jeremy Scahill. The theme was "Critical Thinking in the Media." Dr. Christian Parenti is scheduled for Fall 2014 event. The theme is "Thinking Critically about Climate Change and Violence."
- Three faculty members attended the International Conference on Critical Thinking in summer 2014, and have committed to leading trainings in AY 2014-2015.
- In the Community of Practice meetings, faculty reviewed the results for each domain and discussed ways to model and support the development of critical thinking dispositions in the SLS 1515 course.

## **Critical Thinking**

Students demonstrate achievement of Critical Thinking skills through journal entries and a final essay scored with a faculty-designed Critical Thinking rubric. The goal is that students who complete the course will achieve a 3 (accomplished) or higher on all relevant aspects of the rubric. The charts below display overall mean scores (on a four-point scale) for each rubric domain by semester.





## Writing Support Initiatives

- Faculty continue to provide writing feedback and encourage students to have their writing reviewed by instructional assistants to receive feedback on clarity and use of Standard English.
- Faculty engaged in a rubric standardization and anchor paper development session on June 4, 2014. During the session, faculty reviewed student artifacts and engaged in an affinity process to identify exemplars to use as anchor papers. Anchor papers with annotations will be made available to faculty in Fall 2014.
- In Spring 2013, "Academic Journaling 101" workshops were piloted by the Academic Success Center on the Lee Campus. Due to their popularity, in Fall 2014, "Academic Journaling 101" workshops will be offered on all campuses and centers.

## Success Strategies

Through administration of the SENSE survey, FSW collects and analyzes data about institutional practices and student behaviors in the earliest weeks of college. These data can help colleges understand students' critical early experiences and improve institutional practices that affect student success in the first college year. Figure 6 shows the increase in the engaged learning metrics and Figure 7 shows an increase in students having a clear academic plan or pathway since the implementation of the college's QEP in Fall, 2012.





#### Robert "Dobin" Anderson, Director, Online Learning

More and more FSW instructors are using Canvas (FSW's learning management system). It has been extremely helpful that the students in the Cornerstone Experience course are required to use Canvas to complete their assignments. This allows them to get comfortable with the system early on and makes it more likely that they become proficient with the system for future courses.

#### **Technology Initiatives**

- Peer Architects continue to receive technology training to be able to support SLS 1515 students.
- The New Student Programs Office continues to offer technology workshops and support college-wide. In AY 2014-2015, New Student Programs will collaborate with FSW Online Staff and Computer Science faculty to expand technology workshop offerings.

#### **Engagement Initiatives**

- Beginning Fall 2014, the QEP Assessment Subcommittee I collaboration with the QEP Marketing Subcommittee will send a periodic "Did You Know?" with the most relevant SENSE or CCSSE results and related suggestions for improving student engagement.
- Beginning Fall 2014, the courses formerly offered at 5:30p.m. will be offered beginning at 6:00p.m. to allow evening students to attend workshops and support centers before class.
- During AY 2014-2015, the Office of New Student Programs and Student Life will join efforts to create additional Service Saturday opportunities. Also, Student Life will host their first service oriented Spring Break promoting literacy with the United Way.

## **Peer Architects**





Peer Architects are student leaders who help students with their transition to Florida SouthWestern State College. Each Peer Architect serves as a mentor for first-year students. Peer Architects are assigned to a specific section of the Cornerstone Experience Class (SLS 1515), have office hours in the New Student Programs office, and facilitate workshops throughout the semester.

Little did I know that my involvement as a Co-Chair for the Philosophy Committee of the College's Foundation of Excellence Study conducted six years ago would ignite a passion in me to improve the overall educational experience for our students and lead me on a journey to improve the quality of the classroom experience for the students in my Cornerstone and public speaking classes.

After serving as a Co-Chair for the Philosophy Committee, I proudly agreed to serve on the QEP Task Force where the foundation was laid for the Cornerstone Course. Serving on the task force with a team of FSW staff, faculty and administrators to create this course was an awesome

experience. I am very proud to have been a part of this Quality Enhancement Plan and the capacities in which I have served in as the first Curriculum Coordinator and as the first Lead Faculty for the Cornerstone Course.
