# **Cornerstone Experience** Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) Update

## **Co-Chairs Report "Excellent Progress Made" on QEP Planning**

Edison State College's Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) Committee co-chairs Professor Kathy Clark and Dr. Thomas Rath report that "excellent progress" has been made this semester in fine-tuning the QEP focus and implementation plan.

The Committee is pleased to welcome Mary Stuart Hunter (see page 2) as our QEP consultant. Ms. Hunter will provide guidance on course design and other initiatives supporting a sustainable firstyear course.

A highlight of the semester for the QEP Committee was a productive meeting in late January with Dr. Barry Goldstein, SACS COC Vice President. Dr. Goldstein asked Committee members to think of the QEP as a grant proposal that we are submitting for funding. Many questions were asked and answered during the session, and upon his departure, Dr. Goldstein indicated to District President Kenneth Walker that the QEP project showed "promise."

In addition to progressing on course design, the Committee has fine-tuned the plan for pilot implementation (see sidebar) and submitted a budget for 2011-12. Assessments and indicators have been drafted, and a literature review performed. The Cornerstone Experience course has been submitted to the State for numbering and will carry the Edison State College name.

Professor Clark and Dr. Rath conducted informational sessions at their respective campuses for student services personnel and others who were unable to attend the January Cornerstone Assembly. QEP-related workshops for faculty and staff are in the planning stages, and the initial draft of our QEP document will be reviewed prior to the end of this semester. Committee work will continue through the Summer.

To assist its transition from conceptual discussions to the operational phase of course development, the QEP Committee adopted the following definition of Student Learning on November 19, 2010:

Student Learning at ESC is defined as the development of self-reliance through positive changes that are attributable to the collegiate experience. These changes are expressed through measurable gains in knowledge, skills, behaviors, and/or values that prepare students to be contributing members of society.



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# Adjustments in QEP Timeline

The QEP Committee has elected to delay **Cornerstone** Experience pilot implementation until Spring 2012. The new timeline will enable the College to accommodate necessary professional development for faculty and staff, identify faculty to teach the course, provide proper notification and incentives to students identified as potential pilot participants, and allow adequate time to embolden the QEP marketing and communications plan.

Further, the QEP Committee wishes to incorporate suggestions from our QEP evaluators who will serve as part of the Reaffirmation On-Site Review Committee in November 2011.

The QEP will be highlighted during August professional development days, and related on-site conferences are in the planning stages. Details will follow.

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## **Consultant Compliments QEP Planning and Work Products**



Mary Stuart Hunter, University of South Carolina Assistant Vice Provost and Executive Director of University 101 Program and the National

Resource Center for the First-Year Experience and Students in Transition, is serving as Edison State College's QEP consultant. She visited the Lee Campus on March 24 and 25 for the first visit in a new relationship helping us to develop and implement an exemplary Cornerstone Experience course and First-Year Experience (FYE) program.

In addition to providing assistance with course content and student engagement, Ms. Hunter will guide the College in involving all constituencies in QEP implementation, providing appropriate professional development, and developing implementation plans to include assessment.

At Thursday's session, the QEP Leadership Team discussed the status of the QEP Committee's work, including draft course outcomes. A "man on the street" video, created by ESC student George Schwigk, who works part time as an Edison Online videographer, provided feedback from students concerning what they know now that they wished they had known the first week on campus. Ms. Hunter complimented the group on the QEP plan, process, and work products, and recommended that the critical next step be to narrow and refine the proposed course outcomes to assure that those selected are meaningful, measurable and doable.

The following day, nearly 40 faculty, academic administrators and student services personnel participated in Listening Post sessions focusing on first-year students. Ms. Hunter reminded the groups that the QEP focus is to examine something we are already doing to make it better and more intentional in order to enhance student learning. She said that the first-year experience programs and related credit course are popular QEP topics.

Participants in the Listening Post sessions shared their views on how the Cornerstone course will be different from other courses, including content and learning activities. They were asked to think back to their individual experiences as first-year students, envisioning a hometown newspaper headline summarizing their first semester in college.
