What do you enjoy most about teaching the Cornerstone Experience course?

What skills have you developed through completion of Cornerstone Experience class and by serving as a Peer Architect that will help you in the future?

This fall, the Office of First Year Experience had upwards of **6,000** students sign-in for FYE Programming including academic workshops helping students build competencies in areas such as learning skills and techniques, academic technology, transition knowledge and skills, and key cognitive strategies. Over **1,500** students attended the Critical Thinking Lecture Series, and more than **900** students completed online workshops.



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Through FSW's Critical Thinking Lecture Series, community leaders, as well as faculty representing various disciplines, reached over 1,500 students. Below are several quantitative and qualitative measure of the fall 2016 lecture series.

93.70% of surveyed student participants "strongly agree" or "agree" that the speaker(s) were interesting and understandable.

81.66% of surveyed student participants "strongly agreed" or "agreed" that attending this event encouraged me to think critically about the topic under discussion. N=1.047
