His leadership and remarkable work led him to serve as the Associate Dean, and we are thrilled to announce his recent selection as the Dean of the School of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences.

Page holds a Ph.D. in History from The Ohio State University, a M.A. in History from University of Memphis, and a B.A. in History and Music from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

His wealth of experience and commitment to academic excellence position Dr. Brian Page as a dynamic leader ready to guide the School of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences into a new era of growth and innovation.

Presently, within the School of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences, a diverse range of academic pathways awaits students. Among these offerings are three College Credit Certificates in Audio Technology, Digital Media, and Stage Technology. Additionally, students can pursue three Associate Degrees, namely the Associate in Arts, along with two Associate in Science programs focusing on Digital Arts and Music Production. Excitingly, the School of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences is set to introduce a fourth College Credit Certificate in Social Media Communication in the upcoming fall of 2024, expanding the array of educational opportunities available to students.

FSW Receives \$486,300 Grant to Create Innovative 2-Year Teacher Apprenticeship Program

Florida SouthWestern State College, in partnership with Lee County School District, will develop a no-cost 2- year teacher apprenticeship pathway to the teaching profession, geared toward currently employed paraprofessionals. Apprentices will receive on the job training (OJT) immersive field experience credit while earning their bachelor's degree. The two-year program will begin Summer 2024 with the first cohort of apprentices to complete the program in Spring 2026.

The program will be largely competency based, utilizing a cohort model focused on the apprentice's ability to demonstrate full proficiency in the Florida Educator Accomplished Practices, which outline competencies associated with planning and delivery of instruction, implementation of assessment, and application of differentiation for all learners.
