FSW Celebrates Nursing Excellence: Over 100 Future Healthcare Heroes Take Next Step Toward Patient Care

FSW's School of Nursing celebrated 100+ graduating nursing students during the spring pinning ceremony. This time-honored tradition honors nursing graduates as they transition from students to professional healthcare providers. The ceremony featured special recognition for three students who were awarded the prestigious Lynne Davis Nightingale Award named for Florence Nightingale noting outstanding academic achievement and clinical performance.



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"Our pinning ceremony is a proud moment for our entire college community," said Dr. Susan Holland, Dean for the School of Nursing. "These graduates have demonstrated exceptional dedication throughout their education, and we're confident they'll make a tremendous impact in our community's healthcare system."

Graduates pledged the Nightingale Oath and received their nursing pins from faculty. With the national boards (NCLEX-RN) scheduled for the coming month, these future nurses are in their final preparation phase. Our School of Nursing maintains a strong board exam success, with pass rates above the state average.

As Southwest Florida faces growing healthcare demands, these graduates will join a workforce crucial to serving our community. The pinning ceremony marked not just an academic milestone, but the addition of over 100 compassionate healthcare professionals ready to make a difference in patients' lives.



FSW's School of Education celebrated the pinning of 38 new educators with every graduate receiving an offer of local employment—a testament to Southwest Florida's urgent need for qualified teachers.

About half of the graduating class participated in the Early Bucs program, which allowed them to serve as classroom teachers while completing their final year of studies. This innovative program provided valuable hands-on experience and helped address teacher shortages in Southwest Florida.

"Our graduates have already proven themselves in the classroom," said Dr. April Fleming, Dean of the School of Education. "The Early Bucs program gave them a head start, and now they're ready to make an immediate impact as certified teachers."

In a remarkable achievement for emergency medical education in Southwest Florida, the inaugural class of paramedic students at the North Collier Fire Training Center has achieved a perfect 100% pass rate on the paramedic certification examination. Program leader Ben Rhode worked closely with the students to implement the center's rigorous curriculum, resulting in this unprecedented success.

FSW Biology Students Dive Deep into Marine Science at Florida Keys Lab: Hands-On Research Inspires Future Marine Scientists

Biology II students recently transformed from classroom learners to field researchers during an immersive experience at the Florida Keys Marine Laboratory, where they explored potential careers in marine science and environmental conservation.

Led by professors, Amanda Zirzow and Jordan Donini, students conducted biodiversity surveys in pristine marine ecosystems, documenting species in coral reef and seagrass habitats through guided snorkeling expeditions. The hands-on fieldwork provided firsthand exposure to scientific research methods used by marine biologists.

"Seeing our students' excitement as they identify marine species and collect data in the field is incredibly rewarding," said Zirzow "This experience bridges the gap between classroom theory and professional practice."

Beyond data collection, students engaged directly with marine scientists who shared insights about diverse career paths in conservation, water quality management, and ecosystem monitoring. The marine lab experience exemplifies how FSW's science programs connect students with real-world applications, preparing them for careers that protect and preserve our coastal resources. For many students, this transformative experience solidifies their commitment to marine science careers.







Learning Beyond Borders: Education Students' Service Journey Through Ireland

This spring, a group of seven B.S., Elementary Education students, along with Dr. Joyce Rollins and Dr. Anne Angstrom, embarked on a transformative international service trip to Ireland. The journey provided students with a unique blend of cultural and academic experiences, starting with visits to iconic Irish destinations such as Dublin, Galway, the Burren, the Cliffs of Moher, and Glendalough National Park. FSW's "BitBuccaneers" Make Impressive Debut at International Hacking Competition

In a remarkable display of skill, determination, and cybersecurity expertise, FSW's all-female hacking team, the "BitBuccaneers," secured an impressive 7th place finish at the Wicked6 Cyber Spring Games. The team, consisting of Crystal Wernicke (FSW Program Specialist), Melissa Elizondo, Heather Henry, and led by FSW Professor Rushell Hopkins, competed against other teams from around the world in this rigorous three-day hacking tournament.

What makes the BitBuccaneers' achievement even more remarkable is that they competed at a significant numerical disadvantage. While most teams fielded between 8-10 members, FSW's squad consisted of just four dedicated women. This didn't deter the BitBuccaneers, who demonstrated exceptional teamwork and technical proficiency throughout the competition.

"We knew we were outnumbered, but we were never outmatched when it came to determination," said Professor Hopkins. "Each team member stepped up, often covering multiple roles that larger teams could distribute among several people."

The Wicked6 Cyber Games challenged participants with both offensive (Red Team) and defensive (Blue Team) cybersecurity scenarios. Teams were evaluated on their ability to protect their systems while simultaneously attempting to breach their opponents' defenses. Adding to the challenge, the competition restricted participants to Linux-based systems and command-line tools only. The prohibition of graphical user interfaces (GUIs) ensured that success depended on deep technical knowledge and command-line expertise rather than reliance on user-friendly tools.



FSW's BitBuccaneers secured an impressive 7th place in their debut at the international women's hacking competition. Their performance not only brought recognition to FSW but also highlighted women's growing presence in the traditionally male-dominated cybersecurity field. This accomplishment reflects the quality of FSW's cybersecurity program.

As cybersecurity threats continue to evolve globally, competitions like the Wicked6 Cyber Games play a crucial role in developing the next generation of security professionals. For the BitBuccaneers, this competition was just the beginning of what promises to be a bright future in the world of cybersecurity.
