Course description (provide below)

This course will serve as an introduction to writing and workshopping original poetry as well as crafting critical responses to aesthetically informative examples of poetry writing. The class will study poetry as a genre and explore a variety of poetic schools, forms, and techniques. The term project will consist of a portfolio of poems, the parameters of which will be determined by the instructor. This course has a substantial writing requirement, but writers of all levels and experience are welcome.

General topic outline

• An exploration of the techniques and forms of poetry through creative and critical exercises.

- The study of acclaimed works of poetry to cultivate a nuanced understanding of the craft.
- Frequent in-class workshops to help students develop a critical lexicon and critique their own work.
- The composition of individual poems and the creation of a broader portfolio over the course of the semester.

Section III, Justification for proposal

Provide justification (below) for this proposed curriculum action.

This course is offered at a plethora of other state and community colleges throughout Florida.

Students have long expressed an interest in having a class focused on the craft of poetry because it does not have enough coverage in other courses. Poetry is such a nuanced craft that it requires an entire focused semester to give students an appropriate introduction. Furthermore, some students have only an interest in prose or poetry, and this class will allow them to take courses that are most suited to their needs while also freeing instructors in the general creative writing class to emphasize prose work. These claims are supported by accepted conventions within the field as well as by the coexistence of these classes at state and community colleges throughout Florida. In short, this course will allow us to meet a very real demand by students who want to learn more about the craft of writing poetry. This is a need that has already gone unmet for too long.
